Scopus Evaluation Criteria Orbis Scientific Journal

For a scientific journal to be indexed in a specialized database, such as Scopus, it must meet strict minimum criteria from a formal, editorial, and content point of view. The following are the criteria that authors must consider when publishing scientific articles in the Orbis journal.

Criteria	
Structure	Articles in peer-reviewed journals are usually several pages in length, most often subdivided into sections: summary, introduction, materials and methods, results, conclusions, discussion, and references. See list of articles > http://www.revistaorbis.org/index.html
Content quality	The content of the articles, clear and easily readable text, without errors. It is the content of the articles that will determine whether readers will want to read them and quote them. The content of the articles must be consistent with the scope and objectives stated by the journal and of high academic quality See list of articles > http://www.revistaorbis.org/index.html
Article titles and abstracts of articles in English	The title of the article, the abstract and the keywords are the contents most frequently indexed by the search engines. It is very important that these sections are written in understandable English, reflect the content of the whole article and correspond to the topics of the journal. Bibliographic information in Roman script	All articles must have a bibliography written in Roman alphabet. It is important to have a unity between platforms, especially with the bibliography, since most metrics are based on quotations and if the bibliography is not machine-readable, it cannot be included. Content relevance	The content of the articles must be consistent with the scope and objectives stated by the journal and of high academic quality See list of articles > http://www.revistaorbis.org/index.html
Other information to be provided	
Affiliation	Provide the name of the organization, current work and research activity See list of articles > http://www.revistaorbis.org/index.html
ORCID Identifier	ORCID (Open Researcher and Contributor Identifier) is a non-profit organization dedicated to solving the name ambiguity problem in academic research by assigning a unique Identifier to each author. From their Scopus Profile author, authors can import their list of publications in Scopus and their Scopus author ID into the ORCID. Once an author connects his/her ORCID record to his/her Scopus, a link to his/her ORCID record will appear on his/her profile page.
